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RECYCLING

How to dispose of recycling? Via municipal collection in the blue bin provided to each residential building.




Best practices:

- Empty and rinse containers and bottles before putting them in the bin.
- Put mixed items in the blue bin, not in bags or boxes.
- Group bags together in one bag.
- · Put shredded paper in a bag.
- Separate out different materials (for example, separate plastic caps from glass containers).
- Remember to take items that are not recyclable but still in good condition to a second-hand store.

Plastics

How to dispose of organics?

Raw, cooked or spoiled food



- · Coffee and coffee filters, tea and teabags
- Condiments*
- · Cookies, candies, desserts*
- · Dairy products*
- Eggs and eggshells

Yard and plant waste



- Cold ashes
- Garden waste (except certain noxious or invasive plants listed on the website)

- Tree branches less than 1 metre long and 12 mm thick*
- Wood chips and sawdust

Soiled paper and cardboard



- Paper handkerchiefs, towels, and napkins*
- · Paper tablecloths, plates, cups, etc.*
- Soiled cardboard food containers and packaging (e.g., pizza boxes)*
- Newspapers*
- Paper bags* (including the cellulose-lined ones)

Things you can't put in you brown bin



- Absorbent pads from meat and fish
- · Cat litter and animal excrement
- Certain noxious plants (see chelsea.ca for the complete list)
- Cigarettes
- Dead animals
- Diapers and personal hygiene products (dental floss, sanitary pads, cotton swabs, etc.)
- · Hair, finger- and toanails, fur, feathers
- Household hazardous waste (HHW, such as waste oil, batteries, pain)
- Plastic bags (even those marked compostable, biodegradable, or oxobiodegradable)
- Plasticized or waxed paper packaging (e.g., ice-cream containers)
- Soil, sand, and gravel (except soil attached to plants)
- Stvrofoam
- Textiles
- Tree trunks and stumps
- · Vacuum-cleaner waste
- Wood, cement, ceramics, and other CRD (construction, renovation, and demolition) waste

^{*}Materials difficult to treat in home composters. Brown bin is your chance to get rid of them.

CONSTRUCTION, RENOVATION, AND DEMOLITION (CRD) WASTE

What is CRD?

Materials resulting from the construction, renovation, and demolition of buildings (wood, metals, shingles, gypsum, etc.).

How to dispose of CRD waste?

What are oversized metal items?

Oversized metal items are large objects made primarily of metal, such as:



- BBQs
- Exercise equipment (treadmill, elliptical, etc.)
- Household appliances (washer, dryer, stove, refrigerator, etc.)
- Machine tools without oil or fuel (lawnmower, chainsaw, etc.)
- Metal posts and pipes
- Pumps

How to dispose of oversized metal items?

Oversized metal items are collected on Fridays (garbage collection day). However, you must contact the Municipality at 819 827-1160, maximum 48 hours before collection, so that we can notify the contractor. There is no limit to the number of oversized metal items that can be picked up. The oversized item must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day or at the earliest at 7 p.m. the day before.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW)

What is household hazardous waste?

Household hazardous waste (HHW) refers to waste from hazardous products commonly used in homes, such as used oils, paints, solvents, compact fluorescent light bulbs, pesticides, drugs, cleaning products, etc.

How to dispose of HHW?

It is prohibited to dispose of HHW in the Municipality's regular collections. You may dispose of them through the door-to-door collection organized by the Municipality. For more information, visit chelsea.ca.

You may also drop off your HHW at the following location:

Drugs must be taken to a pharmacy. Small batteries can be brought to city hall.

What is e-waste?

E-waste includes outdated or broken electronic equipment, such as:



What is a textile collection point?

A textile collection point is a place where you can donate textile materials for reuse, such as clothing in good condition for resale or pieces of fabric in poorer condition for processing, for example:



- Clothing
- Curtains
- Pieces of fabric
- Shoes
- · Snow suits

What is an oversized item?

An oversized item is waste that, because of its size or volume, cannot be collected in regular collections.

OVERSIZED ITEMS

During oversized collection, you can dispose of any waste that does not fit into your green bin, for example:



- Bed frames
- Carpet
- Mattresses
- Patio furniture
- Small furniture
- Sports equipment
- Toilet bowls



How to dispose of oversized items?

On garbage collection days, place your oversized items beside your green bin (maximum of two per pickup).



FINAL HOUSEHOLD WASTE



What is final household waste?

Final waste is residue that cannot be recycled, reused, or composted and is therefore destined for the landfill. This is waste that ends up in the green bin, for example:



- Number 6 () plastic items and containers that are not identified by the Mobius loop
- Disposable sweeping cloths (e.g. Swiffer pads)
- Fabric softener sheets (e.g. Bounce)
- Flexible plastic tubes (tooth paste, sunscreen, etc.)
- Incandescent bulbs
- Litter and animal excrement
- Metallic packaging (chip bags, granola bar packaging)
- Personal hygiene products
- · Plastic straws
- Styrofoam
- Vacuum bags and their contents
- · Waxed food paper

How to dispose of household waste?

Through regular municipal collection. Maximum of one 360 litres wheeled bin per collection during the spring/summer months and two 360 litres wheeled bins per collection during the fall/winter months.

IMPORTANT

As of September 1, 2019, all residents will be required to purchase a green, grey or black wheeled bin with a European plug. It requires a maximum capacity of 360 litres and a maximum weight of 100 kg when filled. Visit chelsea.ca/waste for more information.
