

2024-2026 Capital Expenditure Program



Municipal Council adopted the Capital Expenditure Program for the next three years at an extraordinary meeting held on December 20, 2023.

The program calls for investments of **\$57 million** divided in annual phases as follows:

Wastewater and drinking water plants

A massive \$13.5 million investment for the wastewater and drinking water plant.

This work is required because the plants will reach their maximum capacity upon completion of the Domaine du Ruisseau, Hendrick Farm, and Quartier Meredith development projects.

WASTEWATER PLANT: \$12.4 MILLION

- \$754,000 has been earmarked in 2024 for professional services related to the wastewater plant expansion.
- An **\$11.6 million** investment would make it possible to dehydrate sludge through the installation of a centrifuge, thereby reducing the frequency and volume of sludge removal.

DRINKING WATER PLANT: \$590,500

- A sum of \$546,000 is earmarked in 2024 for professional services related to the expansion of the drinking water plant.
- Other items include pump replacements and the purchase of a forklift.

Purchase of land

A provision of \$5.5 million for educational and community purposes.

- A provision of \$4 million has been earmarked to acquire the land needed to build a new elementary school in the Centre-Village. The school will enable more than 350 students to continue their education in Chelsea every year in a modern learning environment.
- An amount of **\$1.5 million** has also been earmarked for the purchase of land to relocate the library or for utilities.

A total of **\$100,000** is earmarked in 2024 for the development of a community access to the river, including professional services and implementation phases.

PURCHASE AND REPLACEMENT OF MISCELLANEOUS **EQUIPMENT: \$1.3 MILLION**

• This includes the replacement or purchase of vehicles required for routine operations and the purchase of equipment for the fire department.

INSTALLATION OF ELECTRICAL CHARGING STATIONS: \$40,000

• \$40,000 for the installation of electric vehicle charging stations. These stations will be installed at Town Hall and in Quartier Meredith.

\$1.9 million is earmarked for the purchase and replacement of equipment essential to the maintenance

PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF GENERATOR: \$540,000

 This amount is for the purchase and installation of a generator at Town Hall. This will allow the municipality to remain operational in the event of an emergency or power outage.

Road infrastructure and safety

\$1.8 million to maintain and improve the safety of our roads.

PURCHASE OF SPEED CALMING DEVICES: \$60,000

• This includes the purchase of radar speed signs and illuminated pedestrian crossing signs.

REPAIR OF CHEMIN DE LA RIVIÈRE: \$500,000

• Road rehabilitation began in 2021 and is well underway. This amount covers the expenditures required to complete the project.

CULVERT STABILIZATION AND REPLACEMENT: \$600,000

• Culvert stabilization and replacement work is planned on Route 105, Chemin Wallace, and Chemin Link.

CHEMIN DU LAC-MEECH: \$650,000

• This amount is to cover the cost of moving public utilities.

Parks and green spaces

\$1 million in new parks and trails.

VARIETY OF WORK ON VOIE VERTE CHELSEA: \$700,000

• This includes the construction of the intersection with Route 105, stabilization of the Vallée sector, signage, the addition of bollards and chicanes, and the development of an interpretive site* for the old station and the Chelsea Elementary School boat.

* This project is conditional on receiving funding.

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TEEN PARK: \$90,000

• This amount will be used to develop plans and specifications for the future teen park.

This project is conditional on receiving funding.

CONSTRUCTION OF A TRAIL IN THE CENTRE-VILLAGE, WEST OF HIGHWAY 5: \$280,000

• A variety of work is planned on this trail, including surface improvements, the addition of ditches, culvert upgrades, etc.
